60th Anniversary successfully celebrated

Sixty years of existence as an establishment may not have the same standing as a Centennial, or a Jubilee—however, it is still a significant historic occasion for our School.

Significant enough for a number of our ex-pupils to show their loyalty and fondness of the School by travelling considerable distances from all over New Zealand and indeed the world to be with us today. We had one from Hong Kong, two from the United States, ten from Australia, and one from England. There were nearly six hundred old boys and partners in all.

The programme for the weekend started with a registration session held in the new library complex. From here senior boys from the School took groups of reunion participants to look around the new school buildings and the hostel. From the comments that I heard back they were delighted with what they saw. The modern, bright, warm, well equipped classrooms, laboratories, computer rooms and the catering suite were well received. The friendly, homely atmosphere and welcoming environment of the School hostel also impressed. The library also served as a show place for various items of memorabilia, old School Magazines, photos and rolls. An ample lunch was provided by in the Schools gymnasium and it was from here that the various age groups were collected together for group photos.

In the afternoon the feature event was the rugby match against Auckland Grammar School. There was a large vocal

crowd of Old Boys, Students and other supporters who braved the icy winds. Other Old Boys, who were no less vocal had an excellent view of the game from the new classrooms that overlook the ground. I spent the afternoon with a number of old boys and partners in one of these rooms. They were most impressed with the brilliant display of running, forward dominated rugby play of the School team and although faces dropped a bit when Kings lost the lead at one stage, the fairy tale 18–17 King's victory left them on top of the world.

The evening get together at the Metropolitan Club was well patronised and many old and humorous reminiscences were made. The formal part of the evening was brief with my Presidential address and Rector, Ian Simpson's comments on the Schools' development and future prospects. The balance of the evening was informal with participants moving around the various grouping and meeting up with old friends.

On Sunday afternoon some of the old boys played golf, bowls, tennis or went running. The finale was the Reunion dinner once again at the Metropolitan Club. This was a major success with master of ceremonies Joe Anderson, being both entertaining and informative. Speakers Professor Dunbar, a first day pupil told of early days at Kings and how things had changed over the years while Rear Admiral Welch told of his time at Kings where he took a part in the Gilbert and Sullivan performance of HMS Pinafore and of his later career in the

navy. Many hilarious tales were recounted by the speakers.

OVER THE YEARS

The School has benefited through many and varied donations and gifts over the years. Most of these are detailed below but will not be a complete record.

In the Association's first year 1939 a contribution of 10 shillings and 6 pence was made towards the prize fund. This contribution continued in many years until 1951 when we instituted new prizes. Books were presented for All-Round Merit (academic and sporting) to 5th Form and Upper 6th Form pupils (no 7th Form then). Also books for general excellence to the top pupil in each 5th and lower 6th Forms. These prizes have varied slightly until currently two prestige prizes for All-Round Merit, the Special Form 5 for English and the Form 5 Chisholm Prize for mathematics are presented.

After the Golden Jubilee an amount of \$475 from interest on an association fund titled Jubilee Fund has been presented. This amount has provided Prestige Awards of Jubilee Scholarships to the Dux and Proxime accessit plus two special prizes for usually Form 7 (one technical).

A glance down the prize list shows that many trophies and awards were given or named after ex-pupils or staff. The Silver Jubilee Cup is awarded to the winner of the Senior 1500 metres.

The Government Print produced limited numbers of reproductions of old paintings by New Zealand artists and these were presented to King's in the 1960's and 70's.

Sundry gifts have been framing Old Boy's photos, presentation of various photos and portraits, a Blues Register in 1950, films for the School to use, the Banner in 1963 and extensions to the Dux board. The first two concrete wickets were funded by Old Boy donors.

Through the association Blues were backdated as they were not issued in the early years.

More recently in 1994 two video players and monitors costing \$1570 were provided for the new Library. In 1988 and 1989 donations totalling \$1000 were made for Sports and Cultural tours. A \$5000 share in the King's Hostel Mortgage Ltd was made apart from the loan of \$100,000 given for 4 years which has now been repaid.

For the Silver Jubilee in 1961 we obtained and paid for a Grant of Arms authorised by the Lord Lyon of Arms in Scotland. This was followed by further approval of an addition in the form of a badge for the Golden Jubilee in 1986.

Large projects were organised for the Silver and Golden Jubilees. In 1959 we joined the Parents Association, School and Staff in a combined effort to raise funds for the Memorial Gymnasium. Nearly 200 Old Boys and the Association made donations. Members of the Committee helped with Gala days at the School to raise funds. The Memorial wall was purchased shortly afterwards.

Prior to the Golden Jubilee funds were raised for extras not provided from tax payers funds for the new Assembly Hall. A new ball game developed with the decision to completely rebuild King's High School. With the hall or auditorium being the last of several stages in the rebuilding members will be aware the Jubilee Building Fund (\$275,492.00 at 31/12/95) is still held by the Association. This matter has been drawn out more than 10 years but the original donations have multiplied several times with interest. As the interest rate over that period has exceeded inflation and costs there is a plus against the frustration and delay.

SUPPORT THE JUBILEE AUDITORIUM APPEAL

This building is the last stage in the school's redevelopment. It will serve not only the school but the city as a whole, especially the southern Dunedin community. It will have a multitude of uses—a performance theatre and mini conference/seminar centre as well as providing a much needed school facility.
