In September 2005, two Dunedin-based Old Boys, Graham Geary and Warren Shirley, while lunching together realised that the following year would be 50 years since they represented their school at 1st XV level against Waitaki Boys as a curtain raiser to the 1st Test of All Blacks v South

Africa, held at Carisbrook 1956. The thought of a reunion to mark the occasion was seized upon and planning got under way just days later. By October that year we were ready to notify all members of the team of the event when it was decided that because it was 50 years, members of the

Cricket, Hockey and Soccer teams should also be included.

Letters were sent out to all involved, over 50 in all to gauge their response to the idea of a 50 year reunion. Those of us who still resided in Dunedin were all keen and it was gratifying when most responses were positive and keen to finalise on a date. We decided on locking it in with a locally played Interschool match, and as it turned out the most appropriate date corresponded with the annual fixture against Otago Boys on June 30th 2006. Arrangements were made with the school for us to use the facilities there to meet and be shown around what is now the new school, to view the facilities as they are now, and for the group to have a luncheon at school before going to the Interschool to be played at Logan Park as so many teams and events were involved.

By the beginning of June 2006 we had the numbers of those coming, and though many had dropped away for various reasons those who would make it were coming as far away as Auckland, Wellington, Rangiora and Invercargill. Apologies came as far away as London (Nic Bain and Ross Simpson) and Melbourne (Doug Stewart).

The morning of the reunion, the weather, contrary to predictions, provided a wonderful sunny beginning which was to carry on through the day as we arrived at school and greeted old friends before being taken on a guided tour of the school by the current head boy Bonar Robertson. We all were impressed by the facilities the boys have now compared to our day, and the range of subjects taught. At the end of the tour we gathered at the brand new Performing Arts Centre for a social hour and a luncheon which was very much appreciated, before boarding our very own bus (provided by the school) and being driven to Logan Park for the Interschool.

We debussed and were taken in as guests of the Otago Cricket Association to view the match from its beautifully appointed Long Room, which overlooks University Oval. The only negative part of the whole day came when we realised that on this occasion Otago Boys were too strong and the school went down 46–8 and we also lost the hockey and soccer matches. After the match it was back on the bus to the Performing Arts Centre where we held an excellent social hour relaxing and viewing old memorabilia and films of our time at school. We are grateful for the support shown to us by the current Sports Administrator, Warwick Larkins, an old boy of the school, who facilitated with the school to help to ensure our reunion was the success it became.

In the evening a Dinner was held at the water-front restaurant, Plato, where the Billiard Room was set aside for us and our partners to enjoy what was a wonderful meal. Lindsay Hocking a former Rector of our old school and stand in Captain of our 1st XV that year (Ian Bassett being injured for the entire season), gave a speech of welcome and toast to absent friends. Thereafter, the evening continued with many laughs and recounting of stories of yesteryear. Needless to say it all went too quickly and as we parted to go our separate ways it was with some sadness that we realised that the next time we would all meet again would be at the School's 75th in 2010.

I would like to thank all who participated along with their partners for making the '56 Sports Reunion the memorable occasion it was.



Earlier this Year

When we learned earlier this year that Shona, daughter of the late Rev N E (Neil) Campbell (1940-43) would be visiting the Sangro River Cemetery in Italy with her young family, we asked her if she would visit the graves of the two Old Boys buried there. It will be remembered from the July *Kingsmen* that Private R (Rewi) Allan (1937-40) was killed in action at Orsogna on 16 December 1943, while Gunner W M (Max) Allan (1939) died of wounds received at Orsogna on 7 January 1944. The cemetery is a well-maintained "green oasis" on the

summit of a sunburnt ridge overlooking the Adriatic Sea some 2km distant. The entrance structure houses a register listing each serviceman, where in the cemetery they are buried and the names and addresses of the parents: in this connection the details concerning Max are a little misleading, for his mother returned with her three children to her family's 'Mayfield' farm in Bush Rd, Mosgiel after her husband was killed in a work-related accident at Hawera in 1930. The register reinforces the youth of the servicemen, and the world-wide nature of the war. Rewi and Max (who were not related) are buried in the same row, just 24 graves apart.

Tom Anderson claims to be the oldest old boy of King's having been four years at Otago Boys' 1932-35. He along with Ian Murdoch and the late Laurie Campbell were 1936 prefects. George Lyon and the late Manly Stratton were deputies. Tom left in July 1936 when he says "thanks to a recommendation from Rector Chisholm I secured a position in the insurance industry where I remained for the next 40 years. Although my time at King's was short I still have fond memories of my days there". Tom was President of our Association in 1947.

Cultural Affairs

Since the July *Kingsmen*, there has been a surge in Old Boy authorship, with no fewer than five having their work published.

Dr J I (Jim) Clayton (1946-50), who ultimately became director of the Dunedin Public Hospital's department of anaesthesia and intensive care has had published *The History of Anaesthesia* at Dunedin Hospital. However a reviewer claims that the title is too modest, and that in reality the book describes the history of modern anaesthesia. Not really written for the general reader, the book is a carefully researched chronicle of the personalities, the technical innovations, and the training of anaesthetists as the speciality developed during the past 100 years. In the early days the task of putting people to sleep for major procedures was left to junior staff with minimal training, which was possibly more risky for the patient than the primary operation itself! Jim details how the process has developed from an art to a highly specialised and skilled science, and covers not only the techniques themselves, but other aspects of pain control and intensive care.

Emeritus Professor D S (Doug) Coombs (1938-42) is the latest scientist to prove that really he is a closet historian, and not merely a geologist! Research into his maternal family tree, and a co-authorship with his wife Anne, has resulted in the publication of Strangers & Pilgrims: the von Tunzelmann Saga. This tells the story of his great-grandmother Elise von Tunzelmann who emigrated to New Zealand in the 1850s, followed by four siblings who ran two sheep stations on the western shore of Lake Wakatipu, while giving their name to the Von River and Mt Nicholas. Inspired by Elise's memoirs, the saga is the result of overseas travel and research into the social and political history of the family since the mid 1550s, and describes the life and struggles the family endured through the centuries, culminating in the move from a very favoured life in what was then part of Russia to the far side of Lake Wakatipu—a huge journey by any standards.

When Presbyterian Support Otago sought an author to record the centennial history of their organisation, Jane Thomson, who had previously edited *Southern People: a Dictionary of Otago Southland Biography* was approached. Sadly she died before she could complete the project, so that indefatigable historian I M (Ian) Dougherty (1966-70) came to the rescue, and *Making a Difference: a centennial history of Presbyterian*

Support Otago 1906-2006 by Ian Dougherty and Jane Thomson has recently been published.

R K (Reg) Graham (1944-48, Staff 1955, 1958-66) has recently had published *Click! Portraits of New Zealanders*, a series of photographs and comments on people who are involved with, and who have made a contribution to the arts. He is well-placed to comment on three of these subjects: fellow photographer N M (Matheson) Beaumont (1941-44) was senior to him when he was a pupil at King's, while printmaker B V (Barry) Cleavin (1953-58) and artist G C (Grahame) Sydney (1962-66) were pupils when he was a staff member.

Dr M J C (Malcolm) Templeton (1936-40, Staff 1945) is particularly well-qualified to write Standing Upright Here: New Zealand in the Nuclear Age 1945-1990, having been sometime permanent representative to the United Nations, and a former Deputy Secretary of Foreign Affairs. The events described in his book span the period from the end of World War II until near the end of the century, by which time New Zealand was beginning to think for itself and to stand on its own two feet as an independent nation. It follows an important thread in the development of NZ Foreign policy in the contexts of intergovernmental negotiation while reflecting the expression of the popular will. Issues included concern nuclear testing in the Pacific and its implications, and nuclear-free legislation and its implications. Previously he has written about NZ policy at the time of the Suez crisis, our shift in attitude towards human rights and race relations in southern Africa, our Antarctic policy, and his experiences in Moscow as a member of the NZ legation.

One of T A (Trevor) Coleman (1973-75)'s compositions for National History NZ (NHNZ) film documentaries Equator (Power of an Ocean) was briefly mentioned in the July Kingsmen. It, together with his composition for Buggin' with Ruud (Madagascar) was nominated for Emmy awards, considered to be American Television's highest accolade. Furthermore a double nomination is a rarity, for there are just five nominations for each category. Although ultimately unsuccessful in gaining an award, Trevor's fellow nominees were amazed to discover, when he visited New York for the awards ceremony, that he didn't have an enormous support crew to help him in his work—he produced 24 film scores for NHNZ last year! Nonetheless the two documentaries have both won medals at the 2006 New York Festivals, and Equator is a finalist at the year's Wild-screen Festival.

The reunion of the early 1970s rock group Lutha, which included current businessmen P B (Peter) Edmonds (1962-63) of Christchurch, WP (Peter) Fraser (1962-66) of Dunedin, and G J (Garry) McAlpine (1963-67) of Auckland for the launch of their 24 track CD Stop! The Music is Over duly took place, as was briefly forecast in the July Kingsmen. Their first meeting since 1974 proved to be such a success that Lutha will reform for a one-off concert in Dunedin in 2007, where they will headline the inaugural Dunedin Heritage Festival scheduled for March 22-26. Because some rust (which never sleeps!) has set in, they will be leaning on friends to help them out—the concert may be billed as Lutha & Friends—one of whom may well be retired Auckland businessman and former heart-throb DAC (Craig) Scott (1963-66) now resident in Arrowtown. The ODT recently devoted 1½ pages to the band when describing its short but glittering life.

The arts world in Dunedin has been well-catered for this October, with the Otago Festival of the Arts following on from the Fringe Festival. Making its debut at the Festival Club in the

Dunedin Town Hall was the talented jazz quintet *Plagiarhythm*, most of whom met and performed at King's: bassist S D (Scott) Campbell (1999-2003), drummer A J (Andy) Patterson (1998-2002), pianist J (Jesse) Robertson (2000-03), and saxophonist P A (Paul) Young (1998-2002)—joined by vocalist Robert Milne (ex Kavanagh College). The group has broad influences, ranging from Fat Freddy's Drop, Nathan Haines and Jamiroquai to traditional jazz masters such as Miles Davis, Chet Baker and Herbie Hancock, as well as writing their own compositions, and play regularly at the Black Dog Bar, and the University Staff Club. Several members of the group complete their university studies this year and plan to travel overseas, but not before hopefully getting into a recording studio and producing a CD sometime in the new year.

This year, with M L (Michael) Andrewes (1957-61) again musical director, the Really Authentic Gilbert & Sullivan Performance Trust has recently staged 'Princess Ida', one of their less frequently performed works.

Business Sector

R H (Ray) Bennetts (1955-59) is managing director of Industrial Knitted Products Pty Ltd, which operates a factory at Geebung, Brisbane. However, he lives at Carrara on the Gold Coast, not far from the casino, and would welcome the chance to show some hospitality to any old friends who might venture that way. He advises that while working full time, he doesn't have to ask a boss for time off when he feels inclined!

Earlier this year, the Government sacked *en masse* the Plumbers, Gasfitters & Drainlayers Board, whose role is to protect consumers through the education, registration and discipline of the industry, and challenged a new Board to increase the numbers of qualified plumbers and gasfitters. The Opposition claimed that the Board had been sacked because of its commitment to high standards of workmanship and safety in the trade! N R (Neil) Burrow (1977-80), sometime president of the Otago Branch of the Master Plumbers Association, and a former NZ rowing representative, has been appointed to the new Board, has admitted that the former Board had lost the confidence of the industry, and hopes to regain this through travelling the country and trying to get plumbers involved with the Board again.

Old Boys may remember the Nanking Café, opened by the Chin family in King Edward St, South Dunedin in 1963. Rebuilt in 1968, and renamed the Nanking Palace Restaurant 15 years later, the premises underwent a massive redevelopment and extension of its services in the 1990s. Apart from its takeaways, it can cater for 200 seated patrons—120 in the Imperial Lounge alone. The business today is run by two sons of the founders, one being N H (Neville) Chin (1978-83).

B R (Barry) Clarke (1952-55) who recently celebrated 50 years as an accountant, still in the same firm with whom he started as a 16 year old, had decided on his profession while at primary school, because he was good at arithmetic! He cycled from King's, in his school uniform, for a job interview with T E V Turpin, and started work in January 1956 at the princely weekly rate of £7.12.6 (young staff in his employ can't believe that this wasn't an hourly rate!). Like many contemporaries, he cycled to attend university classes before and after work, and qualified for admission to the professional association for accountants aged 19, but couldn't be admitted until 1960 when he was 21—he completed his degree two years later. Mr Turpin proved to be an excellent mentor, being thorough, painstaking,

and honest, and although considered rather old-fashioned, he offered Barry a partnership at age 22, and retired to Wanaka some seven years later. Barry offered a younger fellow-worker a partnership, and 36 years later they are still together, having concentrated mainly on servicing smaller firms which might grow, and gaining such clients as a result of their Round table membership, and fellow young-parental activities. They offered big-firm service at medium-firm prices, spurning takeover approaches from international firms. Passionate about Dunedin, Barry became involved in community service, and has served on many heritage trusts, including the Otago Settlers' Association and the first Regent Theatre Trust. He gave up cycling many years ago in favour of owning classic Jaguar cars (he admits to being a cheque-book restorer), and through which he served on the Automobile Association. Nowadays a consultant with Clarke, Craw & Partners, he laments the low standard of vocational advice being offered at high schools and universities.

M P (Michael) Crooks (1981-85) of Timaru is general manager of Canterbury Wool Scourers, a subsidiary of Cavalier Carpets Ltd. In 1988, he was a member of the NZ cycling team to Australia.

After graduating B.Com from Otago University in 1973, B R (Bruce) Dick (1964-68) spent four years overseas before returning to New Zealand, working for the Development Finance Corporation for four years. He then moved to the National Bank before shifting to Rabobank, one of NZ's largest rural lenders in 1999, with promotion to chief executive in 2001. Based in Sydney, Bruce is not fazed that NZ farmers owe financiers more than \$23 billion, because farms today were more robust businesses than formerly, and owners had more management tools and the education to manage such debt. Farmers tended to manage their debt carefully, and were using fixed interest rates to remove the effects of rising cycles. Furthermore the rural sector was growing rapidly, with an average compound growth of 10% for the past few decades. Bruce believes that families will continue to provide the backbone of farm ownership, but that there will be fewer farms as properties consolidated, driven by the need for scale and to be economically viable.

Sixteen-year old S T (Sam) Flaws (2003-05) was one of a group of Otago Polytechnic students to compete at the Fare in Auckland recently. By gaining a silver medal for his pasta dish junior, a bronze for his salmon dish junior, and a silver for his live dessert junior, he was awarded the hot kitchen excellence award and \$1,000. He had previously won a silver and a bronze medal at the Southern Lights Culinaire, held in Invercargill earlier this year.

Nearly five years ago, J S (John) Milburn (1963-67), an industrial chemist with the Otago Regional Council, and his wife took over 'Monarch' Wildlife Cruises, which operates a 54 year old former fishing boat on Otago Harbour. Since taking over the helm, the Milburns have made significant changes, including providing information sheets in eleven languages (nearly 80% of their customers are from overseas). They operate for 364 days a year, employ up to ten full-time equivalent (FTE) staff from October to March and five FTE's during the remainder of the year, and offer harbour cruises lasting one hour, half a day, or a full-day package combining cruising with land-based touring—they also do dinner and wildlife cruises by request. This year they decided to enter the NZ Tourism Industry awards to measure themselves against other operators, and won the Westpac Award for Best Small Tourism Operator.

Sporting Triumphs

Watties Voluntary Coach of the Year

Ten Otago finalists were selected from more than 75 coaches representing 20 sporting codes, two being D G (Dave) Stinson (1965-70), nominated by Caversham Harrier & Athletic Club (athletics), and M D (Melvin) Tudor (1961-64) nominated by Taieri College (cycling). The winner receives a year's supply of Watties canned product and goes on to represent Otago at the national awards at Auckland in November, and the chance to win \$5,000 to put towards their coaching development. Ultimately it was Melvin, service manager at Taieri College, who got to use the can-opener. Already this year his cycling team has won 15 gold medals—six at the South Island secondary school cycling championships held in Christchurch in July.

Bowls

K G (Ken) Walker (1960-63) had a weekend to savour at the NZ Professional Bowls Association tournament at Hastings in September, when he won two trips to the UK! This means that in November he will participate in the Scottish international singles tournament, and in January (with Paul Girdler) he will compete in the world pairs championships held indoors in England. And he won't be coming home empty-handed either: even first round losers win £1,000!

Every February, six southern Christchurch clubs compete for the Stanmore Cup, which was donated by the Linwood Club some 10 years ago. This year a team from Mt Pleasant, managed by F B (Farquhar) McKenzie (1940-44) and skipped by E J (Eric) Richardson (1947-51) was successful.

Bridge

J B (Jared) Fudge (2001-05) started playing bridge with three school friends four years ago, and this has already taken him to tournaments all around the country—three times to Hamilton alone. Now the OU Student regards bridge as a healthy addiction, for he is always hearing little old ladies declaring that it "keeps your mind young", while a bonus is that the Otago Bridge Club "normally has pretty good biscuits!"

Cricket

BB (Brendan) McCullum (1995-2000) is currently representing New Zealand at the ICC Champions Trophy one-day world tournament in India. His brother N L (Nathan) McCullum (1994-98) and BE (Bradley) Scott (1993-97) were members of the 30-strong squad preparing for the tournament, and have been selected for this season's Otago squad.

I A (Ian) Rutherford (1971-74), an Alexandra chartered accountant who has served as executive officer for the Central Otago Cricket Association has stepped down after five years, but will coach the Central Otago under-19 XI.

Cross Country

G A (Geoff) Anderson (1970-74), son of A T (Arnold) Anderson (Staff 1946-70, 1972) and father of current pupil B J (Ben) Anderson won gold in the 45-49 masters men's grade 8km race at the NZ championships held at Stratford, thereby contributing to the silver medal won by the Otago team in this event. More recently he was the first veteran runner (sixth overall) to finish in the Dunedin Moro half marathon.

Cycling

W R (Ross) Gamble (1960-62) won a 35km masters event held in cold and windy conditions at North Taieri in August.

FMX

Freestyle Motocross was first (and last) mentioned in the November 2003 *Kingsmen*, and C D (Craig) Ellis (1990-94), S J (Selwyn) Green (1991-95), and J A (Jason) Young (1999-2003) are still riding for Team Koarse. The team has recently adopted the mini 125cc Reaper 'pitbikes' as a fun way of learning new tricks: in fact Jason is so impressed with their performance that he has become a distributor of the grimly-named brand! Recently they have built a portable ramp set to use for their tricks: it only takes about five minutes to assemble and can be placed almost anywhere, thereby giving the team the flexibility to perform at many types of events coming to venues near you throughout the summer.

Hockey

C W (Chris) Ashton (1998-2002), J P (Jeremy) Botting (1993-97) and D A (Damian) Watson (2000-04) were members of the Southern Men team which played in the National Hockey League this season. Co-coaches were D E (Dave) Ross (Staff 1985-) and P W (Peter) Ashton (1962-66).

Indoor Bowls

After an absence of six years, R J (Ray) Webster (1971-73) a former NZ representative, made a welcome return to the Otago team which defeated Canterbury in the Paterson Trophy match in September. The team thereby qualified to compete for the Welch Trophy at the inter-district national finals in Auckland in October, but was outflanked by Waikato who gained 58 points to Otago's 57!

Rowing

S (Sam) Morrison (1998-2002) was a member of the coxless four which came second in the final at the national championships held at Lake Hood near Ashburton in October, thereby contributing to Otago being crowned national provincial champion for 2006.

Rugby

C J (Carl) Hayman (1993-97) is currently touring England, France and Wales with the All Blacks.

In the recent Air NZ Cup, Carl Hayman and J M (Jason) MacDonald (1995-98) represented Otago, J D (John) Willis (1992-96) represented Taranaki, T E (Tom) Willis (1992-97) represented Waikato, and J M (Joe) McDonnell (1986-88) represented Wellington.

The Otago B team which won their national championship, was captained by L M (Luke) Herden (1991-96), and included R T (Ray) O'Fisa (1999-2001) and U (Uili) Kolo'ofai (1996-2001).

The Otago Country team, which won the Triangular Shield for the first time since 1987, was captained by J K (James) Kenny (1996-2000).

The Otago Colts team included G R (Glenn) Dickson (2000-04), W M (Will) Henry (1998-02), and B R (Ben) Smith (2000-04); the assistant coach was B J (Brett) McCormack (1985-89).

The Otago under-19 team included K (Kensak) Palepoi (2003-05).

For the Otago 125th celebrations, ODT readers were given the opportunity to pick a 'dream team': 22 expert selectors named five people for each position, and the readers were invited to place them in order (eg 5 points for No. 1, 1 point for No. 5). The final team was Greg Cooper, Jeff Wilson, Ron Elvidge (capt.) Lyn Jaffray, EW (Earle) Kirton (Staff 1966), CR (Chris)

Laidlaw (1957-61), Mike Brewer, J A (Josh) Kronfeld (Staff 1994-95), Taine Randell, Charlie Willocks, Richard Knight, C J (Carl) Hayman (1993-97), Anton Oliver and Kevin Skinner. The selectors (but not the readers) then named the reserves: David Latta, Keith Murdoch, Lester Harvey, Peter Johnstone, Jimmy Haig, Duncan Robertson, & Tony Davies; the coach: Vic Cavanagh junior (father of R N (Dick) Cavanagh (1955-58); the assistant coach: L W (Laurie) Mains (1960-64); and the manager: Charlie Saxton. Chris Laidlaw and Jeff Wilson scored top equal (95) in the number of points, down to 44 gained by Taine Randell. I S T (Ian) Smith (1955-59) was a nomination for wing.

Among those attending the celebrations (as revealed by some photos in the *ODT*) were N (Nevis) Jones (1948-52) from Timaru, J W (John) Levido (1953-56) from Ranfurly, I B (Ian) Simpson (1954-58, Staff 1981, Rector 1982-97) from Dunedin, and A R ('Arch') Somerville (1951-52) from Sydney.

Soccer

Representing Otago United in this season's NZ Football Championships are A D (Andy) Coburn (1993-97), J R (Justin) Flaws (1994-98), T C (Tim) Horner (1998-2000), M J (Mike) Abbott (1994-98), & Hayden Gunn (present boy). The Soccer Otago Sportsman of the Year award was shared between Tim Horner and Terry Boylan.

Wrestling

Taieri duly won the NZ Club championships in Hamilton, after having earlier collected most points at the South Island championships in Christchurch. Following the NZ championships in Dunedin, A H (Aron) Miller (1995-2000) was named NZ Coach of the Year—in his first year of coaching!

Bits and Pieces

Dr TM (Terry) Peters (1961-65) graduated B Eng and Ph D from the University of Canterbury before heading to the University of Basel in Switzerland on a post-doctoral fellowship. He is currently employed by the Robarts Research Institute, a nonprofit medical research facility in London, Ontario, Canada where more than 600 researchers are investigating some of the most debilitating diseases of our time, from heart disease and strokes, diabetes, Alzheimer's and many forms of cancer. Terry's laboratory is concerned with the development and validation of tools that allow surgeons performing image-guided surgery to make efficient use of sophisticated integrated MRI and 3-D ultrasound images obtained in real time during the procedure to guide the operative tools instead of relying on pre-operative imaging. This is of immense potential value in closed cavity operations such as deep brain neurosurgery where the object is to be minimally invasive and to obtain the desired therapeutic result by resecting or lesioning the smallest possible volume of brain tissue. In recognition of his research over the years Terry has received many awards and grants. He is Fellow of the Canadian College of Physicists in Medicine, a Fellow of the American Association of Physicists in Medicine (from which he received the Sylvia Sorkin Greenfield Award), a Fellow of the Australasian College of Physical Scientists and Engineers in Medicine and a Fellow of the Institute of Physics (UK).

P J (Peter) Benfell (1986-90) graduated Master of Music in Composition from Victoria University, Wellington but doesn't work in that field. Making a career shift to managing information and specifically records management, he spent a couple of years in Treasury in Wellington, looking after a rather

specific part of the organisation which works in sovereign debt, before moving to London where he's spent five years as Head of Profession within HM Treasury. Recently he received an offer from the United Nations to go to New York for six months, and work within the Secretariat supplying record-keeping support to UN Peace Keeping Field Missions around the World. An inquiry as to whether he is interested in working for the UN Human Settlements Programme in Nairobi has also been made. Uncertain at this stage if the position involves any visits to any of the missions, he is keeping his "fingers crossed", and sends regards to any of his era who may remember him.

The Rev N E (Neil) Campbell (1940-43) who died in March was a Presbyterian minister for more than 50 years, after working for an accountancy firm and graduating with a B. Com. He served in five parishes at Mosgiel, Oamaru, Cashmere Hills, St Andrews (South Canterbury) and South Clutha before retiring to Kakanui. He was one of the officiating ministers at our Silver Jubilee (1961) and Golden Jubilee (1986).

J (Jim) Wren (1939-41) also died in March. In 1942 he joined the family business of James Wren & Co. Ltd which had been founded by his grandfather. Jim remained in the paint, wallpaper and glass supply business for 46 years working his way up and retiring as governing director.

M K (Keith) Heazlewood (1944-46) who died in August was a member of champion St Kilda Brass Bands of about 50 years ago. As a bass drummer he won three National titles, in 1948, 1949 and 1952, but unfortunately missed selection in 1953 for the National Band of New Zealand. Most of his working life he was in the paint and wallpaper retail trade, initially with Andrew Lees, and subsequently was Dunedin manager of Guthrie Bowron Ltd.

W J (Bill) Townsend (1954-57) is living in Naseby and "still selling a bit of real estate to pay the bills." His son Mark (1975-79) is manager of DOC in Motueka where he is in charge of the Heaphy track in the Kahurangi National Park, whilst Greg (1977-80) is CEO of Surfing NZ, and living in Raglan. Bill says "not bad making a career out of being a surf bum."

E L (Lox) Kellas (1960-66), the Portobello policeman, is president of Coastguard Dunedin Inc which recently obtained a 6.8m purpose-built vessel called *Southern Trust Rescue* for search and rescue operations based on Otago Harbour. This is the first time a dedicated rescue vessel has been based on the harbour.

A F (Alex) Armstrong (1948-52) has had 40 years' experience in flying and has spent very many hours at the Taieri Aerodrome building and flying microlights. Not long ago he qualified as a helicopter pilot.

EH (Hartley) Meder (1960-64) recently enjoyed a 120th Birthday celebration (explanation: both he and his wife Margaret (neé King) turned 60). Their children arranged a surprise party and many of the guests had a King's connection—John G Everett (1960-63) of Clyde, Bruce J Callister (1960-64) of Portobello, Ken D Baker (1961-66) of Dunedin, Graeme M King (1963) of Christchurch, Howard J Hill (1963-64) of Hokitika, Phil G Connolly (1960-63) of Queensland, Mike L Young (1954-57 of Waimate, and last but not least his Best Man, Paul D Grainger (1960-64) of Wellington, who gave an amusing address telling of many deeds of Hartley's during King's days and beyond. Hartley replied in the same style and his old friend was not allowed to get away with anything!!!!

Right from 1984, when fundraising began for the Assembly Hall/Performing Arts Centre, successive intakes of pupils have been told that they shouldn't have to sit on the gymnasium floor for too much longer, the new hall was about to be built. Our current Principal Colin Donald when he arrived in 2001 carried on the tradition and pupils were informed "Not long to go now". More recently, school leavers were promised that when the hall was completed they would be invited back to see the finished product. And so in September the word had gotten around and departees from Bay View Road this century turned up one night. To a man they were very impressed with the facility and the following records their current activities in the "outside world":

Com in management, studying for M. Com, drummer with *Plagiarhythm* and *The Retrophonic Funk Machine* (soon to release an album), overseas to England in 2007. Darryl Pearson: OU—medical science. Hayden Rumble: drummer in South Dunedin rock band Soulsellar. Keith Russell: Arthur Stone (ex All Black)—carpentry & building apprenticeship. Jared Smith: guitarist with Soulsellar. Dane Steffensen: Opus International—laboratory technician specialising in nuclear densometer. Adam Thompson: OU—law. Chi Tran: Otago Polytech—architectural drafting. Scott van den Bosch: Arthur Barnett Ltd, selected for NZ rowing trials (eights, fours, pairs). Mitchell Wagstaff: farmer—Outram. Nat Walker: OU—law & politics.

The Adelaide Connection:

A visit to Adelaide in April 2005 so whetted President W N (Warwick) Larkins' (1960-63, Staff 2001-) appetite for things Australian that he returned October 2006 for a second helping. His earlier visit had seen a reconnection made with old family friend R J (Russell) Elmes (1957-60) a successful South Australian hotelier (as reported in the July 2005 *Kingsmen*), and while renewing contact with Russell he attempted to touch base with the other Association members in the City of Churches.

G K (Keith) Souness (1956-60), a fellow member of the 1st soccer XI with Russell, started at King's as a 3ft 10in, 4 1/2 stone 3rd former, with soccer (left wing) and rowing (cox) as his main sporting interests. He attended Dunedin Teachers' College while playing soccer for Tech Old Boys and golf at St Clair before teaching at Waikaka in Southland. Returning to teach in Dunedin, he left in 1972 to teach in the South Australian Primary system, but after five years on Kangaroo Island, and then in various schools around Adelaide, he accepted a retirement package offered to many in 2000. He married an Adelaide girl, and they have two daughters and twin granddaughters. Bowls for the Brighton Club, and driving a bus to take the elderly shopping, consumes a large slice of his life nowadays.

D J (Dennis) Brady (1965-68) worked initially for Alex Campbell after leaving school, and then moved to Shacklocks where he was under the watchful eye of B D (Bryan) Cooney (1959-60), the President's brother-in-law. A very good cricketer (opening batsman), in 1972 he played in one first class match for Otago, scoring 47 runs and taking two catches. In the NZ under-23 XI opposition that day were J A J (John) Cushen (1963-67, Staff 1984-99) who took 3 for 100 from 28 overs, and W K (Warren) Lees (1965-69) who scored 46 & 40-but despite their efforts, Otago under Gren Alabaster won by an innings & 60 runs. Peter (1963-67) who duly attended King's. Keith's career was in the printing, publishing and retail industry, initially with family-owned Coulls, Somerville & Wilkie, but following its merger with Whitcombe & Tombs in 1971, he was appointed general manager of Whitcoulls' merchandising division, so they moved to Christchurch for 16 years, where he also joined the company's board of directors.
